

Eladio Terreros Espinosa. Is an Mexican archaeologist and academic researcher of pre-Columbian Mesoamerican cultures and Oriental porcelain trade in the Viceroyalty period. As of 2003 he holds a position as professor of prehistory and history at Faculty of Philosophy and Letters National Autonomous University of Mexico (FFyL/UNAM), and is also the director of the Archaeological Surveying in Zoques sites of the Municipalities of Tacotalpa and Teapa, Tabasco and Chapultenango, Chiapas.

Terreros course studies in archeology in the National School of Anthropology and History. Graduated in 2003.

Works as research professor titular "C" in the Museum of Templo Mayor-INAH, where I also collaborate in the department of curatorship.

He is a permanent collaborator in the project, "Study of Prehispanic and Colonial Pieces with Nuclear and Conventional Techniques" by Ph. Dolores Tenorio Castelleros, of the National Institute of Nuclear Research, Dr. Nabor Carrillo Flores.

He has given lectures related to the topics of Mesoamerican archeology and the trade of oriental porcelain during the Viceroyalty period, in different national and international academic forums.

He has curated and collaborated in the preparation of various temporary and permanent exhibitions in museums in Mexico and the United States of America.

In the Mayan area, I work in the archaeological projects of El Tigre, Campeche; In the Comalcalco, Tabasco and participated in the elaboration of the Archaeological Atlas of the same State.

In partnership with the Ph. Nogami Takenori of the University of Nagasaki, Japan. They research the oriental porcelain trade during the Viceroyalty period in Latin America.

He has directed archaeological research projects in the Zoque Region of the Sierra Tabasqueña, in the Huatulco National Park, Oaxaca and an Archaeological Rescue in the Historic Center of Mexico City.

Terreros has written and lectured the archaeology of Mesoamerica, where he has particularly focused on the Zoques and their culture. He has also written papers about the oriental porcelain trade
